### It Will Cost More Money.

A new ruling in regard to registered letters went into effect on November 1. 



#### IS NOW A TURRET CAPTAIN.

Warwick Young Man in the Navy Has Charge of Twelve-Inch Gun Which Requires Sixty Men to Oper-

Jacob Weidner, of the U.S. battleship Connecticut, came here from New York on a furlough to visit his parents and will remain until next week. He friends. has been serving in the navy for ten It is the highest rank attained among enlisted men. Jacob has charge of a twelve-inch gun, and has sixty men under bim during drill. It requires three hundred and twenty pounds of powder for a charge. A target as a rule consists of a canvass painted to epresent a ship, about thirty feet high and a hundred feet long. This is towed along by a boat at a distance of five thousand to nine thousand yards. The men in the turret cannot see the effects of their shots, but their aim is directed by men on the tower. A gua is not shot off at random, as the distance speed of the moving ships, and other things have to be reckoned out with delicate instruments. Conditions vary Buch from Saturday to Monday. in shooting at a mark, so that the first shot is only an approximate aim and may go wide of the mark. 


